

The Numerical Features of the Book of 2 Samuel

A New Approach to its Compositional Structure¹

Like the first part of the book of Samuel, the second part is a meticulously organized numerical composition. The two divine name numbers, **17** and **26**, are woven in succession into the fabric of the text to highlight crucial passages and to symbolize YHWH's presence in the events described. The rate of their occurrences in percentages, **72%** of the verses and **64%** of the words, are somewhat lower than those of 1 Samuel, which are **98%** of the verses and **72%** of the words. This means that the averages of 1 and 2 Samuel, taken as a single book, are **86%** of the verses and **69%** of the words. See below.

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Chapters 1-7 have been registered separately as a distinct literary entity, because *the passage as a whole* is finalized and sealed by its **187** (11x17) verses and **2964** (114x26) words.

The compositional structure of 2 Samuel

In the following overview of various divisions, I shall mention the divisions of the book of Samuel as a whole proposed by scholars who ignore the traditional bipartite structure. The divisions of scholars who respect the bipartite structure, will be mentioned here only with regard to 2 Samuel. The concluding verses or chapters marked in **red** are not demarcated by layout markers. The chapter numbers are **bold**.

In the table below, the delimitation of the Parts marked **blue** is based on numerical considerations:

Parts I-V: Chapters 1-7 because of their **187** (11x17) verses in combination with **2964** (114x26) words; **Part IV: 5,1-6,23** because of its **728** (28x26) words; **Part VII: 11,1-12,25** because of its **969** (57x17) words; **Part XIII: 22,1-51** because of its **51** (3x17) verses; **Part XIV: 23,1-39** because of its **444** words, which is a multiple of **37** (12x37), the number of David's heroes (specifically mentioned as altogether **37** in 23,39!). All this causes **Part VI: 8,1-10,19**, **Part XII: 21,1-22** and **Part XV: 24,1-25** to be automatically demarcated.

If the present division of 1 Samuel into **19** and 2 Samuel into **15** Main Parts is correct, then the book of Samuel as a whole divides into **34** Main Parts, which can be regarded as additional evidence for its compositional unity in its final form. At the end of the present file, in Observation 18, I shall briefly review the compositional unity of the book of Samuel and its relation to the book of Kings, paying special attention to the function of the assumed Appendix (21-24), the Song of David (22), and his Last Words (23,1-7), which are generally supposed to be inset poems inserted into the prose text.

* The fact that there is no **P** or **S** after the Song of David in Chapter 22 is a strong indication that Chapter 22 is closely connected with Chapter 23 containing the Last Words of David and the passage about his heroes. This is underscored by the fact that the two chapters taken together are made up of altogether **826** (59x14) words, signifying the signature of David through his name, as in David's Lament for Saul and Jonathan (1,19-27). Observation 5 In Part V: 7,1-29, 11 of the 29 verses (38%) and 146 of the 461 words (37%) are highlighted by 17 and 26. The highlighted passages all deal with crucial episodes in the story.

Until this point (7,29) 2 Samuel has 187 (11x17) verses and 2964 (114x26) words. The fact that Chapters 1-7 have been rounded off and sealed on two levels by both divine name numbers is highly significant, being a most sophisticated specimen of compositional craftsmanship.

That 7,29 marks an important turning-point in the account of the rise of David to kingship over all Israel is underscored by another piece of information. The story how he was *officially* made king, starting with the initiatives taken by Abner until his response to YHWH's promises regarding his dynasty (3,12-7,29), is rounded off and sealed by having 1924 (74x26) words.

And to crown it all, in the account of the events from David's anointment to be king (2,1-4) until 7,29 there are precisely 7 divine speeches with altogether 255 (15x17) words! For particulars, see the overview of the divine speeches at the end of the file.

Observation 14 Only 9 of the 39 verses (23%) and 120 of the 444 words (27%) are highlighted by the numbers **17** and **26**. The highlighted passages all deal with crucial episodes in the story. The total number of words, **444**, is a multiple of **37**, the number of heroes (v. 39b), which is a clear indication that the last words of David and the list of his heroes constitute a single coherent literary unit.

Observation 15 In Part XV: 24,1-25, 20 of the 25 verses (80%) and 391 of the 456 words (85%) are highlighted by 17 and 26. The highlighted passages all deal with crucial episodes in the story.

Note how the concluding chapter of the book is crammed with divine name numbers and their multiples: 153, 17, 52, 85, 17, and 52.

The book of 2 Samuel is concluded by a significant number of words, like five others in the Enneateuch: Genesis (85=5x17), Exodus (26+34), Deuteronomy (34+26), 1 Samuel (68=4x17), 2 Samuel (52=2x26), and 2 Kings (153 9x17).

Additionally 2 Samuel is finalized and sealed by 153 (9x17) occurrences of the name YHWH.

Observation 16

In speeches 1-7 (Chapters 1-7, a coherent literary unit) YHWH speaks altogether **255 (15x17)** words.

In the long bipartite speech (12,7-12) YHWH speaks altogether **102 (6x17)** words.

In speeches 1-10 (Chapters 1-16) there are altogether **51 (3x17)** words in the introductions.

In speeches 1-12 (Chapters 1-23) YHWH speaks altogether **390 (15x26)** words.

In speech 12 (23,2ff.) quoted by David in his last words, YHWH speaks **17** words.

In speech 14 (24,11f.) YHWH speaks **17** words to the prophet Gad.

Speeches 12-15 (23-24) have **34 (2x17)** words in the introductions and altogether **78 (3x26)** words.

These impressive numbers demonstrate the extreme care with which the divine speeches were composed, in order to weave as many as possible numbers that represent YHWH's presence into the text.

The symbolic presence of YHWH in the events described in 2 Samuel is underlined by the fact that the name יהוה occurs exactly **153 (9x17)** times in the book.

The 7 words spoken by the prophet Gad to David on behalf of YHWH (24,18), *"Go and set up an altar to YHWH on the threshing-floor of Arauna the Jebusite"*, fall outside the divine speeches, because they are not explicitly introduced as spoken by YHWH. Despite this, Gad's words have full divine authority, for it is said that David went up according to Gad's instructions, *"as YHWH had commanded"* (24,19).

Observation 17

Some human speeches and series of them stand out as being highlighted by **17** and **26**:

The total number of words spoken by Abner in the battle with Joab (2,14-26): **52 (2x26)**.

The very last words spoken by Abner to David shortly before his death (3,21): **17**.

Joab speaks to Abishai at a crucial stage during the battle (10,11f.): **26** words.

2 Samuel 11 contains 12 speeches made up of altogether **182 (7x26)** words and **680 (40x17)** letters.

All the words spoken by the wise woman summoned by Joab from Tekoa (14,4-20): **234 (9x26)** words.

The story of Absalom's revolt until his death (15,1-18,18): **52** speeches with altogether **850 (50x17)** words.

Hushai speaks to Zadok and Abiathar (17,15f.): **34 (2x17)** words.

For the numerical features of the Song of David in Chapter 22, see pp. 17-18 above.

Observation 18: The unity of the book of Samuel and its relation with the book of Kings

From a numerical point of view, there is no evidence showing that chapters 21-24 as such, or the poetic sections within them, have secondarily been attached to the book of 2 Samuel. On the contrary, the fact that 2 Samuel as a whole, including the supposed Appendix or *Zusatz*, has been finalized and sealed as a distinct literary entity by the **153 (9x17)** occurrences of the name of יהוה can be regarded as a clear indication that 2 Samuel was *in its entirety* designed as the follow-up to 1 Samuel. Numerical evidence supports my conclusion that David's Last Words and its introduction (23,1-7) are integral to Part XIV: 23,1-39 – see Observation 14 – and that the Song of David (22,1-51) is inextricably linked to chapter 23. Note that there is no P after 22,51. What is more, for reasons I have adduced elsewhere, the Song of David, and the other poetic sections in the Story of Ancient Israel, should not be regarded as *inset hymns* which were secondarily inserted into a finalized text, but as *imbedded hymns*, which were composed simultaneously with their prose context. See the "[Introduction to the Embedded Poetry](#)".

So there is no reason to question or to have misgivings about the compositional unity of 2 Samuel 1-24, and for that matter, about the compositional unity of the book of Samuel as a whole.

On the contrary, there is strong numerical evidence showing that, within the book of Samuel, chapters 21-24 constitute a distinct literary entity in its own right, because 1 Samuel 1 through 2 Samuel 20 has been rounded off and sealed by its **425 (25x17)** occurrences of יהוה. What follows, the supposed Appendix (2 Samuel 21-24), is in fact an essential part of the book: its indispensable conclusion. Its function, in my opinion, is to round off the story about the emergence of kingship in Israel, and the reign of King David in particular, before the continuation of the story in the book of Kings. In a way, the so-called Appendix, containing the last deeds of David, his most significant wars (21), his Song as a grand finale (22), his Last Words and his 37 heroes (23), as well as his last failure, the unlawful census (24,1-17), and YHWH's command to acquire the threshing-floor of Arauna and to build an altar for YHWH (24,17-25), is a kind of stepping stone marking the transition from the rule of David to the reign of Solomon.

This settles, in my view, the problem of the compositional unity of the book of Samuel.

What has been said above also resolves the question of the relation of Samuel to Kings: the book of Samuel ends with chapter 24, and the book of Kings begins at 1 Kings 1,1. We simply cannot ignore the fact that the transmitters of the Masoretic text have rounded off the text of Samuel with a colophon containing particulars about the verses, words and letters of the book. It is therefore very unlikely, if not totally out of the question, that the book of Samuel ends at 1 Kings 2,12 with the death of David, or at 1 Kings 2,46 with the establishment of the kingdom in the hand of Solomon. 1 Kings 2,46 is generally regarded as marking the end of the so-called Succession Narrative. However, in my opinion, it is highly questionable whether 2 Sam. 9-20 + 1 Ki. 1,1-2,46 as a distinct narrative unit ever existed. It would be safer to assume that the author/redactor of Samuel-Kings drew on some pre-exilic (oral or written) 'court narratives' for his story about the emergence of kingship in Israel and the rise of David to the throne in Israel.

For an excellent review of the scholarly discussions about the so-called 'Succession Narrative', or 'Court Narrative', see Harold O. Forshey's article in *The Anchor Bible Dictionary*, Volume 1 (1992), 1172-1179.

This brings us to the crucial question: why have the very last part of the story of David, his last deeds, and his death, been positioned at the beginning of the book of Kings? The answer is rather simple: the function of 1 Kings 1-2 is clearly to let David approbate and facilitate Solomon's kingship, due to the lack of a divine oracle granting the throne to him. His legitimacy depends solely on David's approbation. That is why David is still an acting character in 1 Kings, winding-up his activities before his death with a fatherly charge to his son (2,1-9). The story of David ends naturally with his death and burial, particulars about his reign, and the statement that "*Solomon sat on the throne of David his father; and his kingdom was firmly established*" (2,10-12).

But there is more to it. There is evidence to show that the author/redactor used a specific compositional technique, to be found elsewhere in Samuel, to realize his purpose: the procedure to let the *concluding* verse

or verses of a preceding literary unit function as a *cliffhanger* preluding on what follows. It is a dramatic and exciting ending to an episode ‘leaving the audience in suspense and anxious not to miss the next episode’.

See *The New Oxford Dictionary of English*, 1998. For the use of the literary device called a cliffhanger, see Observation 16, page 25, in my analysis of [Numbers](#). Compare also Josh. 4,14 and 24,31 in [Joshua](#), and 1 Sam. 15,15f; 15,35 and 28,1-2 in [1 Samuel](#), and 2 Sam. 11,27b and 18,32 above. For more examples, see page 4 in my analysis of [Trito-Isaiah](#).

But such a cliffhanger can also be ‘detached’ and linked to the next unit, where it serves a new purpose, now functioning as a *prelude* on what comes. For a telling example, see 2 Sam. 11,1 above. In terms of story-telling, 11,1 is an integral part of Chapter 10 dealing with battles, but it has now been ‘detached’ from that context (as indicated by a **P** after 10,19) and linked to the Bathsheba affair, where it preludes on David’s affair with her. The focus is particularly on the fact that “*David remained in Jerusalem*”. This sets the stage for this affair.

The same procedure is to be found in 1 Kings 1-2, a relatively large section. In terms of story-telling, it strictly belongs to the story of David in the book of 2 Samuel, but has been, so to speak, ‘detached’ from its logical setting and ‘transposed’ to 1 Kings where it functions as the prologue to the kingship of Solomon.

For particulars, see my analysis of [1 Kings](#), Part I: 1,1-2,12.
